BUSH FIRE PERIOD


The 2014 - 2015 Bush Fire Danger Period (BFDP) ended on the 31st March, nicely rounded off by the rain on the day. During the seven months the BFDP was in force, Putty Brigade was called to attend only a few small fires, so it was a safe and unconcerned time for the community.

From now until the 31st August 2015 - the last day before the next BFDP commences, will be a safer time to burn off or set fire to the piles you have made. Although Permits to Burn are not required, burning during the month of August can also cause problems. Over the past few years, fires started in August have caused major concerns due to changing weather conditions, including high winds. No matter what time of year a burn is conducted, applicable NSW RFS rules remain the same. Neighbours, including the National Park and Forestry, Hunter Valley Fire Control and the Putty Brigade must be notified of your intent to burn, whether it is an agricultural burn or a pile burn. You must have control lines in place and remain with your fire until it is extinguished.

The fire is your responsibility and if it escapes your property you could be liable for any damage it causes. When attending a fire, make sure you and anyone helping wears non-flammable clothing, including a long sleeve shirt, long pants, a hat, scarf, gloves and sturdy footwear. It is also a good idea to have a water supply available should your fire start to spread in an unplanned manner.

CANCELLATION OF EXPLORATION LICENCES

The Minister for Resources and Energy, Anthony Roberts announced the cancellation of three Petroleum Exploration Licences (PELs), following buy-backs from resources company Dart Energy. One was PEL 460, which covered 352,362 hectares north west of Wisemans Ferry, surrounding Wollemi and south of Bylong and was the one, south of Putty Valley Road at the Putty Road turn off. It included all the blocks off Box Gap Road and the blocks south along Putty Road, including where Dart Energy drilled in 2011.

RABBIT CALICIVIRUS ALERT

Greater Sydney Local Land Services will be releasing Calicivirus across northern Sydney between late March and April to reduce the wild rabbit population. Rabbit Calicivirus is a disease that damages the rabbit's internal organs, and also causes haemorrhage or bleeding.

"The virus is not harmful to native animals or other domestic pets, but will kill domestic rabbits that are not vaccinated against it," says Dr Jayne Weller, exotics, avian and aquatic veterinarian from the Animal Referral Hospital in Sydney.

The virus spreads quickly through rabbit-to-rabbit contact as well as by mosquitoes. "It progresses very quickly, killing the rabbit within 48 hours, and there's no treatment for it," she says. Please ensure your pet rabbit's vaccination is current. A booster vaccination is required every 12 months to maintain immunity.

PUTTY RECOGNISES THE FIRST WORLD WAR SOLDIERS

Putty was a well-established little village with about one hundred residents when Britain declared war on Germany in August 1914.

The "Roll of Electors Voting at Putty," dated 1912-13, listed only twenty eight males over the age of twenty one. Although the age requirement for enlistment was between 18 and 35 years, young men between eighteen and twenty one years were unable to vote so were not listed on the roll. They were, however, old enough to go to war.

Putty Soldiers enlisted in 1915, 1916 and early in 1918. Gallipoli had been evacuated by the time they reached Europe. Australians and New Zealanders were still involved in conflicts in France, Belgium, the Sinai Desert, Palestine, Jordan, Syria, Egypt and Mesopotamia and remained there until Armistice was declared.

Of the five Putty men who enlisted, only three served overseas.


Clarrie Cross, Regimental No. 3214, lived at "Ferndale", Boggy Swamp, and was twenty nine years old when he enlisted on 24th August, 1915 in Newcastle. He served as a Private with the 30th Infantry Battalion, 4th Regiment in Alexandria and France and returned home on 5th April, 1918, medically unfit as a result of an appendectomy. He was discharged on 30th November, 1918.

William George Gibbs, Regimental No. 50319, lived at Long Swamp, Putty and was twenty when he enlisted on 3rd January, 1918 in Singleton. He served as a Trooper with the General Service Reinforcements, 1st Light Horse Regiment in Suez, Port Said, Egypt, Ismalia and Moascan. George returned home on 24th April, 1919 and was discharged on 9th May, 1919. After he returned home to Putty he married and lived for many years with his wife and family.

Jonas (Jack) Robert Medhurst, Regimental No. 5780, lived at Putty and was twenty two when he enlisted on 8th May, 1916. He served as a Sapper with the 2nd Tunnelling Companies Reinforcements on the Western Front in France (Omer & Bologne) and returned home on 15th October, 1919 and discharged a month later.

But not all who enlisted were sent overseas. **Cardinal Laycock**, Regimental No. 88811, lived at Putty and was twenty seven when he joined up. He enlisted on 6th May 1918 in Singleton and was discharged on 29th November 1918, medically unfit due to Myocardial Degeneration. He later joined the NSW Police force and served as Sergeant, 2nd class in Singleton for many years. He was well known in the district as Cardy Laycock.

Roland Dural Merrick, Regimental No. 2439, lived at Putty and was thirty four and married with six children when he joined up. He enlisted on 24th April, 1916 in West Maitland and spent six months away from home training for service. At the end of this period, he requested that he be returned home stating that his wife and six children needed his support. He was discharge on 19th October, 1916 and declared "over age".
