RURAL ADDRESSING - SINGLETON COUNCIL

Council's website provides guidelines for displaying your rural address number to avoid any delay in finding you when required. Whether you own or occupy a property, it is important that your address is displayed and is visible from the road. Odd numbers are on the left-hand side of the road, even numbers are on the right. You will find your correct rural address number on your rates notice.

REASONS FOR DISPLAYING YOUR RURAL ADDRESS NUMBER

Protection in case of an emergency - Protect your family, employees, customers, visitors and your premises. If you need an emergency service, your location will be found faster. A visitor, child or injured person may be unable to give clear directions. Emergency personnel unfamiliar with your area need to find you without delay. Phone, electricity, and other companies rely on an address to begin a new service or to respond to a maintenance issue.

Numbers on a letterbox, post, fence or other structure should be reflective or on a contrasting background, visible in the dark and in both directions. Avoid placing numbers on a gate and keep vegetation trimmed away from the numbers. If the shared driveway or access point leads to more than one property, post all numbers after the start of the driveway and then on each property.

HOW TO CHECK FOR YOUR AUTHORITATIVE RURAL ADDRESS NUMBER

If the number is different to what you have displayed at the front of your property OR if you don't have a rural address number, please contact Council's Land Asset Management Team on 02 6578 7290 and discuss it with them.

You can make numbers yourself or buy them but if you prefer, rural address numbers can be purchased from Council. Costs can be found on their website or call Council on 02 6578 7290.

CHILDREN SAUE PUTTY HALL FROM FIRE - 1951

In May 1950, while Richinda Martin continued to teach the children, the school was inspected and Mr. Charles Hawkins was appointed as an extra teacher. With no accommodation available, Mr. Hawkins boarded with the Ducros family until he left Putty at the end of 1954.

From 1947 to 1957, children of varying ages attended the school and they were Enid & Ronald Café, Margaret & John Ducros, Neville Halton, Beryl Harris, Jan Martin, Jack, Valda, Neville, Ray, Rodney and Sue Merrick and Neal Ninness.

An article from the Singleton Argus dated Wednesday 22nd August 1951 tells the story about the quick thinking and brave action of children of that era.

But for the presence of mind of two young school girls and the fearless conduct of four others, a fire which broke out at the Putty Hall on Thursday would have caused considerable damage and loss.

The girls, whose prompt action prevented what might have been a disastrous fire are Valda Merrick, aged 14 and Margaret Ducros, aged 12. The girls were just leaving the local hall after taking piano practice, when they saw the grass at the rear of the building was ablaze. Without delay, they rushed to their school to give the alarm.

Quickly mustering his four other pupils, the school master, Mr. L.C. Hawkins, armed them with whatever he could lay his hands on and led them out to fight the blaze.

By this time, the fire had taken hold and was sweeping down towards an unprotected timber workers camp, where there was several cars and a number of tents containing among other things, a refrigerator, radios and clothing. The men were away felling timber.

Led by Mr. Hawkins, the children set to work with bags and old coats to beat out the fire. Getting the fire under control before it could take hold at the back of the local hall, the children fought the blaze, foot by foot as it swept towards the camp.

Needing more help, Valda Merrick rushed to the Post Office while the others beat down the flames to keep them from spreading too rapidly before assistance could be hadHelp came at the critical stage. The flames were within inches of the tents and unprotected cars. The fire was brought under control and finally extinguished. At one stage, the schoolmaster, Mr. Hawkins, who was wearing crepe soles had one shoe alight.

Their faces scorched and blackened by the heat and smoke, the children did a magnificent job. But for their fearless efforts to quell the blaze, there is no doubt but that the timbermen would have lost everything they had. The outbreak is believed to have been caused by windblown embers from an untended camp fire.

The four other pupils were Johnny Ducros, aged 6, Rod Merrick, 8, Neville Merrick. 11, and Neal Ninness, 13.

Only Johnny Ducros had any complaint to make. A small boy for his age, Johnny felt he could have done even better that he did if only the sugar bag he was using had not been so small.

The behaviour of these Putty children in a time of crisis is not only a credit to their parents and teacher, but an example for children anywhere in the world.



One forgets that the fire fighters of the late 1940's and fifties fought fires in a different way from our present uniformed protected folk.

RESIDENTS FLOOD PREPAREDNESS STUDY

Many of us live on floodplains. What stops us from learning more about how large floods will behave in our local neighbourhood? What will help us? This research aims to find out.

Safer people know more about how minor, major, and large floods behave locally. EG,


- ~ safer drivers understand the need to "Turn Around, Don't Drown" on local roads
- ~ safer households keep valuables safe by Storing & Stacking, Treasures on Top
- \sim safer homeowners protect property by Waterproofing, Wetproofing, or Dryproofing when they renovate or rebuild
- ~ safer communities use one-way values and bungs to keep chemicals and sewage out of floodwaters
- ~ evacuating residents protect everyone by Shutting off Gas & Electricity, stopping Property Fires.

Around the world, flood preparedness campaigns generally have not worked. This is disappointing for everyone. Until people who live within reach of floods are given the opportunity to explain to researchers what helps and what hinders learning more about local flood behaviour, education campaigns won't match what they need.

Please, share your views on what helps you and what hinders you from learning more about local floods. Share your stories, or take me on a walk and point out your local flood features. It's a conversation with me about floods in the place you live. Together we may learn more about local floods that help us keep ourselves, friends, family, or neighbours safer and better protect our belongings.

By taking part in this research study, you will help change flood education campaigns for the better. No one needs to have any prior knowledge or experience of floods to join the study, but you need to be over 18 years of age. The form below explains the study, lets you check if you are eligible, and then register to join the study.
