2022 promises to be an event filled year supported by the Hunter Region Landcare groups and Local Land services.



Bishop Daniel and the monks of the Putty Peoples' Monastery are very thankful for everyone who came and enjoyed our first monastery open day. It was a great chance to see familiar faces and be introduced to many of our neighbours. Yes, the monks were first to go on the jumping castle and bubble soccer, not to mention the face painting!







Fr Shenouda, a monk from the monastery, gave a brief introduction about the monastery and then announced the start of our bi-weekly event at the Putty hall. He said, "These events will start with some interesting activities such as dart throwing competitions, making pasta, baking bread, learning to draw, photography lessons etc., the idea being to get people together while learning something new.

These will be followed by an optional Bible study. However, before you skip reading this, we understand that many people have problems believing in God or the Church or Priests and Clergy but many of us are very curious about who Jesus is and what He said and did. In fact His impact throughout history has affected millions of lives.

In our first five events we will be talking about the life of Jesus, His encounters with people from different walks of life, the miracles He did, and most importantly, if He really claimed to be God or just a good teacher. PUTTY SCHOOL 1943 to 1951

The education for the children of Putty continued from January 1943 to January 1945. Then, after a break of twelve months, the children were back at school. With dwindling student numbers and difficulty in sourcing a teacher, the government decided to close Putty Public School and by August, 1946, the children once again had their education disrupted.

From then on, records became quite sketchy, but it appears that a Subsidised School was established in 1947.

This type of school was designed for localities where the minimum attendance required for a government school could not be met. While the Department paid a subsidy for each pupil, parents were totally responsible for providing the school building and the teacher. Fortunately, there was already a school building.



The reopening of the school remained in question. In 1948, following negotiations between Putty residents and the District Inspector of Schools, approval was given. Getting a teacher was the next problem. Although letters were written to several recommended teachers, offering more than the Government wage, no reply was received.

Good news came after an advertisement was placed in a Sydney newspaper.


Mrs. Elizabeth Richenda Martin came to Putty during September 1949. She, her husband David and their son Jan arrived late one afternoon. They had travelled by train to Singleton, then by cream lorry to Putty. The school building, which stood alone on the Eastern side of

the Putty creek had been converted to provide accommodation for the family with lessons held on the verandah.

From their home, there was no other building to be seen but one could be imagined by following the smoke from an invisible chimney. Finding it involved a long trudge as well as carefully crossing the creek on a submerged log.

Putty Creek flooded in 1949 which meant that most of the children could not get to the school. As a writer of many books, the flood also prevented Mr. Martin from going to the Putty Post Office to send his letters and copies of manuscripts.





So a decision was made to relocate the Martins to the other side of Putty Creek.

Another house was found for the family and it was transported from "up the valley" to stand beside the Putty "Progress" Hall. Classes, including piano lessons, were held in the hall where Mr. Martin also spent time, writing his books.


Richenda's pupils travelled to school on bicycles or on horseback, singularly or in pairs. Counting Jan Martin, there were twelve children ranging in age from six to fourteen years.

Mrs. Martin was well liked amongst the children except when she would mop the hall floor using Phenol as a disinfectant to ward away colds and 'flu. The fumes would make the children's eyes water!





In her work, Richenda made use of radio lessons and correspondence school.





The Martin family left Putty in early 1951, moving to Melbourne.
